All worked with the students and spoke at the Careers assembly. Department for Work & Pensions held a parents' workshop for all their career concerns.

The theatre group "RahRah" work experience show had to be cancelled due to the snow until later in the summer term.

The community we work alongside for work experience and visits, came together for our annual Careers Fair. This year the Mayoress Hannah Gray came along and made a speech to our students, about how important it is to have career events like this and to speak with the various employers and employees from the community. She thanked the professionals attending and giving the students a meaningful encounter of their career and discussing with them how it was achieved and what qualifications were needed. The Mayoress then made time to speak individually to the students. The employers that attended were the London Fire brigade, an author, electrician, plumber, NHS, LSEC colleges and in-house employees. The students enjoyed the experience.

We held our very own Enterprise Fair. The students from all classes took part, enjoying the understanding of an enterprise idea. We all had a very exciting week and our students really related the events to the world of work.

Careers, Educational visits and work experience at Baston House school, have certainly had a busy spring term by the many meaningful visits within the community. We are also very fortunate to work closely with Bromley LSEC college. They provide us with the opportunity for our key stage 5 to visit in small groups across the academic year, which gives the students a feel for college life and what to expect.

It was such a fun day out! The children loved bouncing around, climbing the ninja warrior obstacle course and completing challenges.


We then celebrated with a yummy McDonalds and KFC. It was a fantastic day out to celebrate the hard work of the whole class.

HERZON BROWN VISIT







On 16th March 2023 Hezron Brown, a lived experience speaker, visited our school. Hezron speaks about the challenges he faced as a young person, suffering with a bad temper and being homeless. These events led to getting caught up in gang culture and nearly being sent to prison for 10 years; after that near miss, he decided to change his life around. Realising education was key, he concentrated on enhancing his skills which led to an opportunity with the Princes Trust. He was then recruited by the Birmingham Rep Theatre and became an ambassador for the Princes Trust, speaking at key events to raise awareness of the struggles that young people face.

Due to the work, he has done, he was awarded Ambassador of the Year and was personally invited to Buckingham Palace where he met HRH Prince Charles for the first time. From then he created his own company, More Talk More Action, and later won the 30 Under 30 Award (30 most inspirational people in Birmingham). His most recent achievement was in October 2019 when he was presented with the Pride of Britain Award for the work and dedication he has committed to young people and professionals over the years.

To date, he has spoken to over 150,000 young people across the country spreading awareness of the negative effects of gang culture and raising aspirations to become positive contributors to their community.

Students in years 7-14 were split into two groups and, along with staff, enjoyed Hezron's engaging speech. All the students thoroughly enjoyed the speech and asked Hezron questions afterwards. One student said "this is the best thing that we have had at Baston".





MOCK EXAMS -MARCH 2023





We would like to take this opportunity to say how proud we are of the pupils who undertook mock exams this half term. We know this can be a worrying and challenging time, but the pupils have shown incredible resilience and displayed such a positive attitude in doing their best. Pupils and parents will shortly receive these results.

Summer Exams-May to June 2023

The Summer 2023 examination period will run between 10th May to the 28th June 2023. You will shortly receive your child's candidate examination entry form which will include the date and timings for each exam. Please be aware that some exams will finish after 3.05pm, therefore transport home will need to be arranged separately for your child. Please check your child's exam timetable carefully. If this is the case, it will be highlighted on the individual examination entry letter.

Exam Contingency days 2023

The Joint Council for Qualifications (JCQ) have put in place contingency days in the event of national or significant local disruption to exams in the United Kingdom. This is part of the awarding bodies' standard contingency planning for exams.

For the June 2023 exams, the awarding bodies have therefore introduced two additional half-day contingency sessions. These are on Thursday 8 June 2023 and Thursday 15 June 2023. The standard contingency day remains at the end of the exam timetable being scheduled on Wednesday 28 June 2023. Candidates must remain available until Wednesday 28 June 2023 should examinations need to be rescheduled.

Results day 2023

Results day for all pupils to collect their exam results will be on Thursday 24th August 2023. Further information for exam result collection will be sent out prior to the end of the academic year.

SCIENCE WEEK



On the 13th March, Baston House School welcomed its annual Science Week, and in true Science week form we thought it best to open with a bang! The theme of the first day was focused on reactivity, where pupils were invited to our science lab to watch a classic demonstration about the reactivity of alkali metals in water. This is an experiment that students will participate in with the Key Stage Four Science curriculum. However, as it was science week, we thought it best to scale things up slightly.



After a series of modest explosions, the laboratory demonstration was complete, and students were invited to join the science team on the sports field. This was where we made things a little bigger, choosing one of the classroom favourite alkali metals to see what happens on a larger scale. When Sodium is placed in water it splits the hydrogen and oxygen atoms, creating a great deal of heat. The hydrogen released from the reaction then ignites providing us with the first of many explosions, and the demise of many plastic buckets.



Tuesday brought us some of our crowd favourites, in the form of Exothermic Reactions. For a reaction to be Exothermic it will be accompanied with the release of heat. This provided us with an opportunity to stay out of the cold and rain, warm up back inside the lab. The experiments started with pupils being invited to express their competitive sides, through the medium of Sugar Snakes. This is a satisfying exothermic reaction between sugar and baking soda, where during this reaction both products decompose to produce a seemingly growing carbon snake out of the flames. The tallest snake wins! After some friendly competition, the reactions started to get much more exothermic, with the much-requested "Elephant's toothpaste".

After a brief break on Wednesday to clean up the great elephant's toothpaste flood of 2023, we were back to business looking at the effect of surface area on reactions. Turning seemingly innocent ingredients such as sawdust and sugar into "Dragon's Breath". Powdered sugar is carefully puffed across an open flame, which gives the spectacular illusion of a Dragon breathing fire! While also seeing how much energy is packed into our sugary sweet treats.



With the week coming to a close, it seemed fitting to up the tempo (as well as the temperature) and introduce a personal favourite topic of ours: Reduction Oxidation reactions. Much like the great duos of the world, including Ant and Dec, Socks and Sandals, and Protons and Electrons, you just should not have one without the other. Reduction and Oxidation are no exception, and when they are invited, things are going to get hot! This mixture of rust and aluminium does not get along well, and once introduced to a little ignition, this mixture will dramatically react and easily reach temperatures of 2550 degrees Celsius.

Science week at Baston House School, was an exciting opportunity to exhibit many of the aspects of science that students will learn throughout their science lessons. With pupils across all of our key stages invited, our Science Department could really show off what science at Baston House is all about, and we are looking forward to continuing a tradition of showstopping science weeks to come.

SCHOOL UNIFORM



This is a reminder that it is the expectation for students to wear school uniform. It has always been a belief at Baston House School that uniforms:

- Give pupils a sense of belonging
- Help pupils share a common identity regardless of finance, background, culture or religion
 - Remove pressure to buy designer label clothes and shoes that not all can afford
 - Signal the day has started and helps sharpen the brain for learning
 - It makes a busy morning routine easier
 - Remove the monitoring of appropriate vs inappropriate clothing daily in school.

Whilst we will endeavour to have as many of our pupils as possible wearing school uniform, we also are nothing but flexible and understanding. Some of our pupils may present sensory difficulties and certain fabrics and clothing can be a trigger.

If that is the case, then we suggest that parents encourage their children to wear clothes which resemble the school's uniform.

School's uniform is:

Post 16 – If students decide not to wear school uniform then smart casual clothes to be worn
Secondary - Black, Grey or Charcoal Trousers or shorts, Tracksuit Bottoms or skirt. White School Polo
shirt, Navy School Jumper, Blazer (optional), White Shirt (optional), School Tie (optional)
Primary - Black, Grey or Charcoal Trousers or shorts, Tracksuit Bottoms or skirt. Yellow School polo shirt,
Royal Blue School Jumper, blue and white gingham summer dresses (optional)
Footwear - Suitable school footwear, if trainers are worn in school these should be black
PE Kit - T-Shirt, Shorts, Tracksuit Bottoms, Suitable footwear (no colour stipulation)
