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


## MORLEY FARM TRIP

## BUSHCRAFT TRIP -LIFE IN THE WILD















Giving pupils extremely sharp knives and also encouraging them to light fires isn't something that happens at Baston House School; however, during a glorious trip to a Kentish forest, it was the order of the day!

On the 15th and 16th of June, a group of pupils and members of staff travelled by coach to Penshurst Place, where they were greeted by staff of The Bushcraft Company and taken to a clearing amongst the pine trees. Home for the next two days were traditional canvas bell tents and everyone was soon making themselves comfortable and exploring their surroundings. The weather was absolutely perfect, warm and sunny, and the instructors were soon engaging the pupils in all manner of outdoor survival techniques. Students were shown the safe way to use knives and then, under close supervision, had to sharpen thick sticks, which would have made excellent tent pegs.

Lighting fires using traditional methods can be very tricky (no matches or lighters were allowed!) but once again, the instructors demonstrated the best method to get the kindling going. Marshmallows warmed on sticks over the fire was an added treat!

The instructors soon had burgers, both veggie and beef, sizzling on a grill over an open fire and they were top quality and absolutely delicious – even those more used to burgers from the 'Golden Arches' were impressed, high praise indeed!

Building shelters was also on the agenda, so everyone went to a different part of the forest and set about constructing something suitable from branches, twigs and leaves. The shelters differed considerably in design but everyone tried their best, which was great to see but I personally think that the masterpiece that Kade and I constructed (surely a contender for the TV show 'Grand Designs!) was the best!

Not everyone relished the thought of sleeping under canvas, with some wanting to stay up chatting, despite the curfew. The camp eventually quietened down and everyone had at least a few hours sleep; me, I slept under the stars! The second day was equally enjoyable, with fantastic weather and several members of staff received a welcome dousing, when the shelters were put to the test using a few gallons of cold water! All the food served was of a high quality and nobody went hungry, thanks to the on-site kitchen. It was absolutely wonderful to see everyone getting stuck in and I'm sure that any future Bushcraft trips will be very popular indeed.

**KS1 Creative crafts** - One of the projects was to create an electronic flashing keyring. Learning about a basic circuit, LED's, drilling holes and adding an image. Another project was designing and making a chair for a teddy bear and testing the size and strength.







Key Stage 3

#### Year 7 - Pewter Casting with Aluminium presentation box

The students developed their knowledge of metals and manufactured boards and created a pewter keyring and aluminium presentation box. They learnt how to create templates and moulds and used a metal casting process to manufacture the keyring. They used a range of equipment and processes and produced these lovely products.





#### Year 7 - Clocks

Manufactured using CAD/CAM for the clock face and then using a mixture of spray painting and hand painting for the finish. The base was shaped using the belt sander. The outcomes look amazing.

#### Year 8 – Picture Frames

Students used a corner lap joint to create their picture frame and used nuts and bolts to assemble the other parts of the frame. They even added a stand made from dowel rod. The frame was painted, and CAD/CAM was used for the decorative parts on the front of the frame. I'm sure you'll agree they look very

professional.







#### Year 8 - Door Plaques

These were drawn in a CAD program and the parts cut out on a laser cutter. Students then assembled the parts and added various decorative finishes. Testing the products on a door.










#### Year 9 - Wooden Box and coasters

Students created a box using timber joints which they varnished to ensure it was waterproof. The coasters were painted on the back and the fronts were created using decoupage and varnished too. Some examples

DT Club — students can attend twice a week during lunch times. They can work on an individual project of their choice. One student decided to create a clock based on the Pixar lamp and another student created a Captain America shield.





#### NCFE Level 1 Award in Creative Crafts



The students worked hard designing and manufacturing products for their coursework.

The Brief was to Design and Manufacture a product to solve the issue many people have of storing small items/objects that was inspired by Art Deco. They used numerous tools, equipment, machinery and CAD/CAM (Computer Aided Design/Computer Aided Manufacture) in their creations and the results are stunning.

They also produced a power point to go alongside their products to show how they designed, modelled and manufactured it.

#### NCFE Level 2 Award in Creative Crafts

The students worked hard designing and manufacturing products for their coursework. The Brief was to Design and Manufacture a side table that was inspired by the Memphis Design Movement. The side tables were manufactured using mainly CAD/CAM (Computer Aided Design/Computer Aided Manufacture) and the results speak for themselves. They also produced a power point to go alongside their products to show how they designed, modelled and manufactured it.




### **MATHS**

## SCHOOL UNIFORM



This is a reminder that it is the expectation for students to wear school uniform. It has always been a belief at Baston House School that uniforms:

- Give pupils a sense of belonging
- Help pupils share a common identity regardless of finance, background, culture or religion
  - Remove pressure to buy designer label clothes and shoes that not all can afford
    - Signal the day has started and helps sharpen the brain for learning
      - It makes a busy morning routine easier
  - Remove the monitoring of appropriate vs inappropriate clothing daily in school.

Whilst we will endeavour to have as many of our pupils as possible wearing school uniform, we also are nothing but flexible and understanding. Some of our pupils may present sensory difficulties and certain fabrics and clothing can be a trigger.

If that is the case, then we suggest that parents encourage their children to wear clothes which resemble the school's uniform.

#### School's uniform is:

Post 16 – If students decide not to wear school uniform then smart casual clothes to be worn
Secondary - Black, Grey or Charcoal Trousers or shorts, Tracksuit Bottoms or skirt. White School Polo
shirt, Navy School Jumper, Blazer (optional), White Shirt (optional), School Tie (optional)
Primary - Black, Grey or Charcoal Trousers or shorts, Tracksuit Bottoms or skirt. Yellow School polo shirt,
Royal Blue School Jumper, blue and white gingham summer dresses (optional)
Footwear - Suitable school footwear, if trainers are worn in school these should be black
PE Kit - T-Shirt, Shorts, Tracksuit Bottoms, Suitable footwear (no colour stipulation)
